WORD OF INTRODUCTION

Dear Friends,

As the IPA Treasurer, one of my primary tasks is preparing and managing financial budgets. The income for the IEB Treasury is collected solely through the annual levy, and that amount is calculated from membership numbers. So the more members we have, the lower the levy can ultimately be set, or the more the IPA can spend on global projects; however if membership numbers decline on a continuous basis, either the levy has to increase or the spend needs to be reduced.



As depicted in the graph on the next page, we have seen a reduction in IPA membership over the past number of years. In 2013 we had 412,127 IPA members, but that number dropped greatly in 2014, when over 37,000 Turkish members had to withdraw following the attempted coup d'état.

We had a steady increase over the following years, but the Covid-19 pandemic then took its toll. With a world in shut-down and no IPA activity, membership numbers began to decline once more. This rate of decline based on its current trend line is projecting our 2025 membership at 330,000.

All of this number crunching does not solve the problem, but merely highlights the loss in revenue and asks questions about our future.

Do we simply increase the levy each year and hope that membership will return? Or do we make cuts to spending and if so, what do we eradicate?


I believe activity is vital, and the IEB are committed to supporting activity across the globe. Transformation is not a future event, it is a present-day activity, and I'm confident that if the IPA promotes activity, new members will come.

Over the past two years, the IEB Treasury reduced the annual levy by 50% to cater for the pressures of the Covid-19 pandemic, and in 2022 we are supplementing the levy by €70,000 in an effort to drive activity in each IPA Section. Therefore, this year's international levy is at the reduced rate of €1.48, and the levy invoices will be circulated later this month to each Section.

The IEB are also closely looking at our spending. It is very difficult to predict the future costs of airfares and travel given global oil prices, but this will undoubtedly impact on the cost of World Congresses.

One cost reduction measure could be to conduct the congress through English only, thus reducing the necessity for expensive interpreting. In 2021, we held a virtual congress in English, and in general this worked quite well.

Traditionally, we hire up to 10 interpreters to translate into 5 different languages. We provide translation booths as well as pay for flights, accommodation and meals for each of them. While they have provided us with an excellent service through the years, it comes at a very high cost, which has been in the region of €45,000 each year. The IEB are bringing a motion to the World Congress this year proposing the congress is held in English only. But that's a discussion for the IEC delegates in October.



In the meantime, activity remains a key priority. It is now time to bounce back and create opportunities that will get IPA members talking and promote brand value. In the 1989 movie 'Field of Dreams', the actor Kevin Costner says: "build it and they will come." Over the past 70 years we have built something great, and we all owe it to the future generations to build an even better IPA.

I urge the IPA world to build activity and promote your endeavours through our social media channels, websites, the IAC and this monthly newsletter.

AROUND THE WORLD

IPA Germany: Ukraine - we are helping ... ми допомагаємо

War in Ukraine...

...the shock and concern for the people paralysed us, but not for long. It was clear to IPA Germany that help had to be provided, immediately!

With the beginning of the refugee crisis, we received more than 40 offers from IPA families, who were willing to welcome children, women, and whole families of Ukrainian colleagues into their homes.

In order to provide the refugees with relief supplies, committed IPA friends became active and put together relief transports, which were initially financed by the German IPA Section and then became more and more extensive through a variety of donations.

German IPA members, but also the International Executive Board and IPA Sections Ireland, Iceland, Canada, North Macedonia, Switzerland and Turkey transferred generous amounts that were spent directly on relief items, and so the first transport of supplies could start.

So far, around 60,000€ have been collected and more transports could be organised. Again and again, IPA friends use their free time to go to Poland and bring their deliveries to where they are needed, with the help of IPA Section Poland. Since some of the transports are by bus, on the return journey our friends are able to take Ukrainian refugees back with them to their new destinations.

This really shows what friendship means, and the IPA can be proud. Several radio stations and newspapers are also reporting on the relief efforts and thus give hope for further financial donations, which will enable us to continue helping.

The team of the first transport tells the following story:

“On 10 March 2022, two of my colleagues and I drove to Poland in a bus and a truck. The bus transported almost 7 tons of relief supplies. Unfortunately, I could only transport 3.2 tons in the truck.

After almost 1,500 kilometres, we arrived at our destination in Chelm, where we were able to hand over the donations from IPA Section Germany, as well as from our acquaintances, friends, and relatives.

Beforehand, we had supplied two children's homes in Łódź with everything that was urgently needed. Mostly Ukrainian orphans are cared for there.

Our colleagues from Ukraine reported from the war zone first-hand, and their reports and mobile pictures made us feel queasy.

Afterwards we drove to a refugee home in Hrubieszów with colleagues from IPA Mecklenburg-Vorpommern. This place is located 5 km from the Ukrainian border. We contacted those responsible and offered our support to take refugees to Germany. I will never forget the impressions I gained there.

Until the following day at 06:45 am, there was no-one who wanted to go to Germany. Then a call came that 13 refugees wanted to go to Dresden. We could hardly believe it, but 30 minutes later the entire bus was full of people, and one could see that they all had obviously experienced a lot of suffering and exertion.

I stood next to the senior transportation coordinator while heart-breaking scenes unfolded in front of the bus. She suddenly noticed how difficult it was for me to speak. Tears ran down her cheeks, and she said to me: "I've been doing this for two weeks now, and I feel like this every day here".

I don't want to imagine what was going through people's minds as they got further and further from home minute by minute. Our journey led via Katowice to Dresden, and from there to Frankfurt.

Then we had to go back to work, but the next vacation days are booked. We will continue and will not leave these people alone, some of whom got on the bus with just a small plastic bag.

Originally, we had expected a maximum of 13 people for our transport of refugees who had fled from the war zone. When the bus was suddenly full, we had to improvise. The previously purchased sausages, sweets and drinks would not have lasted long for 44 people. We tried everything to enable particularly the children to have a carefree ride. Luckily, one of our team, Mathäus, speaks Polish and was able to bridge the language barrier well.

We tried everything to offer our passengers a warm meal before the expected lengthy ordeal in the initial reception centre (EAA) in Dresden. Despite good contacts to the German Red Cross in Rhineland-Palatinate and the Order of Malta Volunteers in Dresden, it was unfortunately not possible to organise anything adequately in this short time. However, we were promised help for our next transport.

About 170 km before Dresden, we drove to a motorway service area and invited everyone to a warm meal in the snack bar there. Exhausted from the day's exertions, we finally arrived at the EAA in Dresden at 11:00 pm. It is a strange feeling to collect people from a school gym, drop them off at another gym, and then to just drive away.

Leaving the hall, we saw exhausted, sad, tired, and hope-seeking faces. My last police teddy bear found a happy new owner here. We said goodbye to the Ukrainian refugees, and then received the best possible reward for our work: a quiet 'Spasibo' and a smile."

Facts and figures of the first transport:

We spent 180 working hours on the preparation and follow-up plus the trips, we used 800 litres of diesel for the bus and 250 for the truck to transport 10 tons of relief supplies and drive 44 refugees to Dresden ...

IPA Poland Serving through Friendship – for Ukraine

The day when the war in Ukraine began will forever remain in our minds. We knew the world would change. Nothing will ever be the same again. Photos and video clips showing the invasion of Russian troops in Ukraine, explosions, people hiding in shelters ... situations we had only seen in the movies up to now. Until recently, none of us expected such a human drama to take place so close to us, between two countries belonging to our association as part of our IPA family: IPA Ukraine and IPA Russia. Together, we had proudly expressed our motto "Servo per Amikeco" - to serve through friendship.



Suddenly we had to answer the question: what now? What should an association that is by definition politically neutral do? Our members, however, did not wait for the decisions of world authorities. In the face of such a huge human tragedy, "serving through friendship" took on an even stronger meaning. Hundreds of IPA members from all over Poland started raising funds for Ukraine.

We got in touch with our Ukrainian friends to find out exactly how we can help, and what their needs are. Almost every day, tons of products, including essential equipment, as well as medical and food supplies, are now delivered to the eastern border from Polish IPA members.



We are also trying to support Ukrainian orphans who ended up in our country. Hundreds of such children are currently residing in Polish orphanages. We have not forgotten about police dogs, providing them with hundreds of kilogrammes of food. However, we do not focus our help only on the territory of Ukraine.



The men who stayed behind in the war-torn country kept telling us to help their wives and children. We have not remained deaf to these appeals. We knew that people who escaped from Ukraine and found themselves in Poland also needed us. Members of the IPA (especially from border regions) help refugees day and night during their very difficult first moments in Poland. They provide food, help to carry luggage, or give information about the opportunities that our country opens up for them. They are close to this human drama. They try to give encouragement and strength to Ukrainian mothers, and make their children smile for a moment.

One of the first decisions of the Polish national board was to prepare a special form for IPA members, in which they can express their willingness to accept refugees under their roof, as well as report other possibilities of assistance. Ukrainian families live in the houses of Polish IPA members, and we are trying to help them also through the IPA regions. We do everything to make them feel safe in these difficult moments. On the IPA website and Facebook, a message in Ukrainian was posted, assuring the willingness to help the members of IPA Ukraine. None of us want to sit back and wait.



Not only the Polish Section of the IPA helps. Police from all over the world help Ukrainian families. IPA convoys full of the most necessary products from all over the world arrive in this war-torn country! Many representatives of national sections from European countries, including Germany, Italy, Spain or the Netherlands come to the Polish-Ukrainian border. They bring the necessary products, but also offer transport for those fleeing the war. They help orphans who were evacuated from Ukraine and ended up in Polish orphanages. We try to support them in this help, so that both they and the gifts they carry through Poland safely reach those in need. We help them logistically plan their trip, we organise accommodation for them if they need it, or we indicate places where help is most needed.

Although IPA members from all over the world have by now shown their solidarity and helped each other more than once, "Servo per Amikeco" has never had such an overtone. This war has left its mark not only on the citizens of Ukraine, but also on all of us. It has touched the hearts of people from all over the world. We realise that the citizens of Ukraine will need our help for a long time



Even if the war ends soon, it will take years for the country to recover from this tragedy. We know this and are already planning long-term assistance. We will not leave our Ukrainian friends in need. This is why the IPA was created - so that we, as police officers, unite, help each other and others.

IPA Serbia's Kikinda Region offers Humanitarian Aid

The wish to help was at the heart of IPA Serbia's Kikinda region when disaster hit a local family.



During the night of 7-8 February 2022, a fire broke out in the chimney of the house of the Martinov family from Mol in the municipality of Ada, and then spread to other rooms of the house and the ceiling, causing the entire house of about 60 m² and its contents to burn down. The family stayed on the street for one night, and their situation was all the more serious due to their severe health issues.

Shortly afterwards, representatives of local businesses from the municipality of Ada and the local government came to the rescue and provided construction materials for the erection of a new house for the family. At the initiative of the Ada IPA sub-region and with the support of the IPA Kikinda region, the decision was made to organise a humanitarian fundraising event.

On 7 March 2022, a dinner was organised in Ada for all members of the IPA Kikinda region, as well as for IPA supporters and businesspeople of the Ada municipality. Each guest had the opportunity to donate money, which would go towards the family, as an aid in solving their housing problem. The IPA region of Kikinda was guided by the slogan: "A little bit from us - means a lot to someone". On that evening, an amount of about 100,000 Dinars was collected (around 900 Euros).



On 16 March 2022, a delegation of the national IPA Serbia section - Kikinda region visited the unfortunate family to see in person what had happened, and what they were going through. Proud of the humanity of the entrepreneurs of the municipality of Ada, the local government, as well as the IPA members who recognised the need to collect aid, the IPA Kikinda delegation handed over the collected money and gifts to the family, in the hope that they will soon have a new home.

We wish the Martinov family health, peace, and happiness.

Surprise Donation for IPA UK Member

Members from IPA UK's Scarborough branch and their twin branch IPA Ludwigsburg organised a surprise lunch and presentation for Scarborough branch member Colin Phipps at a local pub on Saturday 19th March 2022.

Colin, a former amateur rugby player, underwent surgery on his spinal column in August 2021 after suffering many years of pain and injury, including a broken back suffered during working at height training, while still a serving police officer.

The procedure was not without risk, which Colin knew, but without it, he had been told he would never walk again. The operation was successful in that it freed up Colin's spine, but it still left him unable to walk. Colin was told by medical experts that he would be confined to a wheelchair for the rest of his life. He spent 3½ months in Pinderfields Hospital Spinal Unit, Wakefield isolated from his 5-year-old son Jacob and his first granddaughter Maddison, who was born days before he was admitted to hospital.



Spurred on by wanting to be the best possible father and grandfather, Colin has since confounded the medical experts and, with lots of physiotherapy, training, determination and fighting spirit, can now walk short distances with the aid of sticks.



On learning of Colin's plight, and in the true spirit of the IPA, friends from IPA Ludwigsburg donated 2500€ to help with practical support for Colin's future. Lars Herold from IPA Ludwigsburg, a friend of many Scarborough branch members, including Colin, travelled to the UK for a brief visit to see Colin and was hosted locally. In addition to the cheque, Lars also presented a bottle of local German wine to Colin's partner and a toy to Jacob. In return, Lars was presented with a Metropolitan Police Whistle by Secretary Chris Charlton on behalf of the Scarborough Branch.

Lars said, "When we heard about what happened to Colin, we decided to initiate a donation for our friend from Scarborough and collected 2500€. As we had not just wanted to send a bank transfer, I said, I was going to bring the money over myself and here I am! It was amazing to see Colin walk into the pub on his own. Best of our IPA wishes to Colin and his family. We hope to welcome him in Germany again very soon."

The surprise lunch was organised with the help of Colin's partner Kelly. Colin said, "At 56 years of age, I am still amazed at the ability of fellow humans to surprise me having seen the worst of everything in my lifetime. I am absolutely dumbfounded by this gesture and am extremely grateful for the friendship that has been shown to me which has been nurtured over the years through the IPA. Vielen Dank!

IPA North Macedonia hold successful Balkan-Adriatic Meeting

IPA North Macedonia hosted the 6th Balkan-Adriatic Conference dedicated to the "Migrant Crisis and the countries of the Balkan-Adriatic Region" in the IPA Skopje Region from 12 to 14 November 2021. Delegations from 9 out of 16 member states, Greece, Cyprus, Bulgaria, Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Slovenia, Romania and Montenegro, plus the host North Macedonia, took part, and delegations from Germany, Poland and Israel attended as observer countries.



The meeting also welcomed guests from the IPA Skopje twin region of Halle/Saale from Germany, Zagreb from Croatia, Timisoara from Romania, Brčko from Bosnia and Herzegovina, Niš from Serbia, Burgas from Bulgaria and Regija Jug from Montenegro. On Friday evening a friendship dinner was held for all.

On 12 November 2021, the conference was attended by the Minister of the Interior Mr. Oliver Spasovski, the Director of the Public Security Bureau Mr. Saso Tasevski, representatives of FRONTEX, IOED, the Federation of Trade Unions of Macedonia, Mr. Darko Dimovski, the North Macedonian Police Union led by Mr. Marjan Kicev, the assistant director Mr. Toni Stankovski and the Chief of SIA Skopje, Mr. Toni Jakimovski, as well as delegations from all regions of the country.

The President of IPA North Macedonia, Mr. Robertino Acevski and the President of the IPA Region Skopje, Mr. Igno Stojkov opened the conference with their welcoming speeches. This was followed by a speech of The Director of the Public Security Bureau, Mr. Tasevski, who addressed the attendees on the topic this year's conference "The Migrant Crisis and the Countries of the Balkan-Adriatic Region". In his speech, Mr. Tasevski welcomed the delegations on behalf of the Public Security Bureau and as an IPA member, and highlighted the objectives of the IPA. Regarding the migrant crisis, Mr Tasevski stated that illegal crossing through the Western Balkan and Adriatic route was still active, used by migrants from the Middle East and Africa on their route to Western European countries, mostly for security or economic reasons. Attempts to cross the border illegally to North Macedonia showed a downward trend of 36.5 %, more than 60% for detected cases of migrant smuggling, and a decrease of the number of new asylum applications by 70%. He detailed that the joint organisation and coordination for intensified surveillance of the southern border, by hiring police officers from abroad, continued, with police officers from eight countries participating in this activity in joint mixed patrols with members of the border police, with the aim of preventing attempts for illegal entry or exit of migrants from the Republic of Greece, as well as detecting cases of migrant smuggling.



The Minister of the Interior, Mr. Spasovski, also addressed the Conference, welcoming the delegates and guests on behalf of the Ministry and thanking for the invitation. He emphasised that the IPA family was constantly growing, from about 50 enthusiastic police officers from the Ministry of the Interior in the beginning, to over 7,000 members today, with numerous international activities and contacts around the world. He referred to the organisation of several international events, including the Central-Eastern European and the Mediterranean Conference in 2022, and stressed that the commitment, enthusiasm and work of IPA North Macedonia was recognised internationally, resulting in the allocation of the IPA World Congress 2024.



Mr Spasovski welcomed the IPA humanitarian actions with regard to the Covid-19 pandemic, in which IPA members, as well as companies and individuals helped secure and distribute protective equipment intended for police officers on the front lines. He concluded by giving his full support to the IPA, stating he was convinced the conference would continue to deepen international police cooperation. He wished for successful

discussions, as well as a strengthening of friendships – existing and new.

IPA Vice President Mr. Kyriakos Karkalis from Greece also addressed the conference, via video link. He congratulated IPA North Macedonia on organising a highly successful regional meeting and expressed his thanks to President Robertino Acevski for the opportunity to address the delegates by video conference.

The second working session of the Conference included a presentation by the Secretary General of the IPA Region Skopje, Mr. Igor Manojloski, on the migrant crisis, prepared in cooperation with the Department for Border Police, and a video presentation by Mr. George Demetriou and Mr. Kyriakos Perikleous from IPA Cyprus, on the IPA International Folklore Festival, taking place in Cyprus in 2022. In addition, Mr. Vojislav Dragović, Vice President of IPA Montenegro, held a presentation on the IPA Games 2022 in Bar, plus Mr. Eran Israel, Secretary General of IPA Israel and member of the IPA Socio-Cultural Commission addressed the meeting.

At the end of the working sessions, the flag of the Balkan-Adriatic Group was handed to the President of IPA Bosnia and Herzegovina, as host of the next Balkan-Adriatic Meeting in 2022. The conference was closed by the President of IPA North Macedonia, after which all delegations exchanged gifts and were awarded with coins dedicated to the 10th anniversary of IPA North Macedonia.

In the afternoon, all guests visited the "STOBI" winery in Gradsko for a wine tasting session, and the gala dinner in the "Denicija" restaurant in Skopje was attended by over 200 guests. On 14 November, all delegates were invited to the opening of the new IPA North Macedonia & IPA Region Skopje offices.

We take this opportunity to thank all our members who were involved in the organisation of this conference, and our IPA friends who helped and supported us both with the Conference and the new IPA offices.

The Chairperson of the Opole Voivodeship Group, Olga Gaida, received an engraved plate presented by the President of the Polish IPA Section, and three colleagues from the Opole Voivodeship Section were honoured with Polish IPA Section medals.
