AROUND THE WORLD

Thank you from IPA Estonia to IPA Germany's Bork Region for their assistance with the Children's Camp 2022

In cooperation with the leadership of IPA Germany's Selm Bork region, our camp for children from underprivileged or large families took place from 30.06 - 10.07.2022. 20 children from Estonia (including 10 from large families of police officers) and 20 from Latvia.

The drive to Germany started in the early morning of 30 June, and we were joined by the Latvian children in Salaspils. The first night was spent in a hotel in Byalistok, Poland. The next morning, we continued our journey, and stopped in Świebodzin where the world's highest statue of Jesus is located (33m).



By the evening we had reached Slubice, a town on the German border, and stayed once more in a hotel. On the morning of the third day, we made it over the border to Germany, and stopped near Magdeburg to stretch our legs with a walk on the Kanalbrücke water bridge, where an aqueduct can be crossed with boats. Two cargo ships passed us while we were there, so we could happily wave to the crews. By the afternoon, we made it to the Selm Bork Police school, which became our home for the following days.

We were greeted by our IPA Bork hosts, who gave us a tour of the house, a fire safety briefing and the keys to our rooms. We had dinner at the IPA house where we could chat, and we ended the evening with a bonfire.



The days at the camp went by fast, and included swimming in an indoor pool, getting familiar with local police vehicles and even go-carting.

The children were able to pet a police dog and see how the dog performs his duties. We also walked to a spring which marks the beginning of river Ems (362km).

The children gained unforgettable memories in the Stukenbrock safari park, where they saw many different wild animals right from the bus windows. The most exciting part of the day in the park was when we took a special train through Monkeyland. Monkeys jumped onto the train, holding

on to the nets on the sides, and we were allowed to feed them with nuts and dried fruit made especially for them.

The children were amused when the monkeys' hands were in the cups sorting out their favourite treats. Some of the braver children put the mixture into the palm of their hands and let the monkeys pick their treats from there.

As there can never be enough swimming, we were taken to the Waltrop Badespaß outdoor swimming pool.

This year, we were able to go to Düsseldorf, to the Nordrhein-Westfalen Ministry of Interior and meet with the Minister of the Interior, Herbert Reul, who is a supporter of the children's camp. We sang the song „Pödra maja“ („Moose's house“) which includes well-known movements that come with it, with the employees of the Ministry joining in.



In addition to all the previous excursions, we visited the Sea Life centre in Oberhausen and the Maximilianpark in Hamm, where there was a Playmobil exhibition which turned into a musical wonderland at one point.



We ended each of our days with a Bear Cub circle, where everyone could talk about what they liked the most about the day and why and, of course, if they did not like some parts.

The only thing left to do by then was to drive home. Every trip must come to an end, and all children were reunited with their parents safely.

Once again – Thank you to IPA Bork, whose leadership made this camp possible.

IPA Japan celebrates its 60th Anniversary with a Pledge for further Growth!

On 2nd July, IPA Japan held its annual general meeting for the year 2022 in Tokyo. Following the meeting, as part of the 60th anniversary events, our members presented their contributions in foreign languages, and the Commissioner General of the National Police Agency delivered a lecture. We then hosted a celebration with over one hundred attendees. IPA Japan was affiliated as a national section of the IPA in 1962 at the 5th IEC in Geneva, Switzerland. Since then, we have continued our activities and this year we celebrate our 60th anniversary.



At the beginning of the general meeting, the IPA hymn was played. Thereafter, the president of IPA Japan, Mr. Masahito Kanetaka, gave the opening address in which he praised the past activities and spoke about the future vision of the section. This was followed by reports from board members and a discussion of our current issues. An announcement was made that a member from IPA Japan will be sent to the World Congress in Spain this October as an observer through the training programme to experience exchanges with other IPA members. Furthermore, plans to hold a "Friendship Judo Week" in 2024 by inviting about 20 Judo enthusiasts from various IPA sections were also reported. In addition, the participants discussed how IPA Japan should respond at the World Congress to Russia's invasion of Ukraine.



After the general meeting, two events were held to commemorate the 60th anniversary. Firstly, four members presented their points of view on the IPA's activities and the internationalisation of the police in English, Italian, French and Spanish respectively. Next, the Commissioner General of the National Police Agency, Mr. Itaru Nakamura, gave a lecture on the topic of "Cybercrime and Police Activities."

The celebration event to mark our 60th anniversary was a remarkable success, with many guests in attendance, including the Commissioner General Mr. Nakamura and Mr. Hidehiko Yoshida, a gold medallist in Judo (78 kg) at the Barcelona Olympics.



The celebrations began with an address by President Kanetaka, followed by congratulatory speeches and a toast. After the opening, there was a lively exchange among the attendees, and Mr. Yoshida, who is also a supporting member, spoke enthusiastically about his future aspirations and willingness to cooperate with the "Friendship Judo Week" in 2024. We would like to thank all those who attended the celebrations and pledge to further develop IPA Japan.

Die Kurzfeuerwaffen- und die Bogenschießdisziplinen wurden bei dieser Ausgabe von zwei Luxemburger Polizisten geprägt.

Beim Handfeuerwaffen-Wettbewerb glänzte Nico Crelo mit 6 Goldmedaillen.

In den Disziplinen PPC Pistol, PPC Revolver, distinguished Pistol, distinguished Revolver, service stock Auto und service stock Revolver belegte er jedes Mal den ersten Platz.

Silber gab es für den Luxemburger in der Disziplin PAP Revolver Mixed Team und zweimal Bronze im PAP Revolver Einzel und im PPC Pistol gemischt.

Gilles Seywert konnte zwei Polizei Weltmeistertitel im Bogenschießen gewinnen:

Im Free Style (90 Pfeile aus drei verschiedenen Distanzen) erreichte er 896 von 900 möglichen Ringen.

Einen besonders wichtigen Erfolg erzielte Seywert aber im Field Wettbewerb (auf 24 Scheiben, davon 12 bekannt und 12 unbekannt) wo er 417 Ringe schoss, 4 mehr als sein 6 Jahre alter Luxemburger Rekord.

Neben den zwei Goldmedaillen, inklusive neuem Landesrekord, gab es auch eine Silbermedaille und zwar im 3D Schießen. Der 38-jährige Seywert ist übrigens Mitglied im COSL Elitekader.

Eight teams participated in the tournament: IPA Dubrovnik, IPA Split-Dalmatia, PGP Imotski, IPA Šibenik-Knin, IPA Sarajevo, IPA Una-Sana Canton, IPA Herzeg-Bosnia County and the host IPA West Herzegovina County (IPA ŽZH). The winner of the tournament was the IPA Splitsko-Dalmatinska (SD) team, which in addition to winning the cup and medals for the first place also received a large transitional trophy. The best player of the tournament, Mario Kraljević, who also came from the IPA SD team, received a special award from the sponsor of the tournament, HT Eronet - a Samsung mobile phone. The second place went to the hosts IPA ŽZH, from whose team the best goalkeeper of the tournament, Bernard Glavina, was named. The third place was won by the IPA Sarajevo team, whose player Haris Mešanović was named top scorer. The PGP Imotski team won the Fair Play Cup.

The tournament furthermore featured a match between the women's teams of IPA ŽZH and the 4th Infantry Brigade of the Armed Forces of BiH from the barracks "Božan Šimović" from Čapljina, played for the first time.

The match was won by the 4th Infantry Brigade of the AF BiH, and both women's teams received special diplomas, medals and trophies. This match was a full success, and it is therefore planned to continue this form of friendship.



As part of the tournament, a special certificate of appreciation was presented to the former president and founder of IPA ŽZH, Mr. Zoran Smital, for his overall contribution and commitment, and a certificate of appreciation will be handed to last year's tournament organiser Mr. Milan Galić, Deputy President of IPA ŽZH, who unfortunately could not attend due to illness.



The diplomas, certificates of appreciation, medals and gifts were presented with the help of the Mayor of Posušje, Mr. Ante Begić, immediately after his active participation in the event under the slogan "I love running". In addition to special thanks to Mr. Begić, it should be noted he can be seen as most deserving for this opportunity, as he enjoyed over 50 events within the "Posušje Summer 2022", which also saw the participation of some IPA members, which is a beautiful example of cooperation in the local community, just as

IPA Romania holds successful certified Self-Defence Seminar

The long-awaited end of the coronavirus pandemic came with a number of projects. In addition to social and sport events, we focused on professional projects, as the online period deepened some shortcomings in the area of exchanges of experience specific to police activity, so useful and so desired by all our members.



Based on well-established connections and relationships within IBZ Gimborn, Mrs. Magda Raducu, President of IPA Region 25 Bucharest, proposed a practical self-defence seminar with ASP (Armament Systems & Procedures) instructors.

Therefore, between 21-23 June 2022, 33 police officers completed the training module "Tactics and techniques for training police officers" at the "Alexandru Ioan Cuza" Police Academy in Bucharest.

The target group, according to ASP standards, consisted of police officers working in the field of public order, the penitentiary police, gendarmerie, operations and special actions, and the instructors were Philipp Kurz, Vice President of IPA Germany, Fabio Red Rossi, former investigator and Carabinieri police chief in Italy, an ASP certified instructor, and Marc De Leener, ASP representative. At the end of the course, based on the results obtained at the theoretical exam and the practical test, the 33 participants were certified as trainers.



The project is an example of the spirit of the IPA – Servo per Amikeco!

Proof of the positive experience can be seen in the feedback of one of the participants:

40th Anniversary Celebrations at IPA South Africa

On 16 June 1982, Section South Africa was formally founded in Cape Town, and the Founding Interim Committee was elected.



On 16 June 2022, which is also Youth Day in South Africa, IPA South Africa returned to the shores of Cape Town, the “Mother City” of our country, to formally celebrate the 40th Anniversary of our founding. The anniversary celebrations were held at the IPA House Timour Hall Villa, which has been in existence since 1796, and was described by Hilary Mauve in 1989 as “An Eccentric Yet Gracious Old Lady”.

Looking back over the past forty years, Section South Africa has experienced a

most wonderful journey and has throughout this time upheld the principles of the Association. It is our privilege and honour to be part of this history.

We applaud and salute all our predecessors for having paved the IPA road for us back since 1979, when initiatives began for South Africa to become a member of the broader IPA fraternity.

Following the election of the Interim Committee on 16 June 1982, the 1st National Executive Committee of Section South Africa was elected on 23 July 1982 with 31 members in attendance. Four members who attended this meeting fulfilled a key role in the history of Section South Africa and that of our country. During our anniversary celebrations, Section South Africa honoured the following four members with a “Founder’s Certificate”:

- **M.C.W. (Mike) Geldenhuys**, elected as a member of the 1st National Executive Committee, and President of IPA (SA) from 1982 to 1984;
- **SJJ (Basie) Smit**, who was in attendance at the anniversary celebrations, who served on the National Executive Committee from 1986 to 2007, and who became the 4th IPA (SA) President in 1990, a position he held for four consecutive terms (1990 to 2004). He also served on the International Social Commission (2000 to 2003) and held the position of International 3rd Vice President from 2003 to 2006;
- **Jarvist (Pilot) Loots**, served on the National Executive Committee from 1991 to 2004, and was elected as the 5th President of IPA (SA) in 2004 and held this position until 2013;



- **G. (George) Fivaz**, who served on the National Executive Committee from 1993 to 1995, and in 1995 was appointed by the late President Nelson Mandela as National Commissioner of the South African Police Service, a position he held until 1999. In 1996, he was also appointed as the 2nd Honorary President of IPA South Africa.



The recognised individuals, of whom Basie Smit, Pilot Loots and George Fivaz are all still with us, fulfilled a critical role in the history of our Association.

We additionally had the privilege to pay tribute to those members who were instrumental in the establishment of Section South Africa during the years 1979 and 1982, namely Roy Moore (formally recorded as the Founder of The Section), Paul Bjvoet and Uli Gehring.

Uli, who honoured us with his attendance, had undertaken various engagements with the Executive Management of the SA Police Service between April 1981 and June 1982, to have the IPA established in South Africa. These initiatives eventually bore fruit, with formal approval being

granted by the then Minister of Police on 28 March 1982. Additionally, Uli was instrumental in the establishment of the 1st IPA Region, namely the Western Cape Region (Cape Town) on 12 January 1983, when he was also elected as the 1st Regional Secretary.

The history of Section South Africa over the past 40 years is filled with many highlights, of which the following are just a few to mention:

- The purchasing of the “Amikeco Centre” in 1994, property of IPA (SA) that serves as our National Administrative Centre;
- We have operated 8 IPA Houses over the years, each with its own uniqueness, that were established to provide our members with affordable accommodation. Of the 8 IPA Houses, we sadly only have 3 IPA Houses still operating, namely Timour Hall Villa Guesthouse in Cape Town, which is also a National Monument; the Johann Rissik Guest House in Pretoria that was built during 1924 and occupied by the then Surveyor General, Johann Rissik, after which the city of Johannesburg was named; and Gamka Moore Guest House, in Beaufort-West;
- The many activities hosted by IPA Regions for the benefit of our members and the support given to those in need in society;
- Various visits of the International Executive Board to South Africa;
- Hosting the 31st International Executive Committee (IEC) at Sun City during September 2002, with 489 attendees from across the world;
- The hosting of the IPA Friendship Week following the IEC in the Kruger Park and Cape Town, with 300 participants;
- Hosting of the International Youth Gathering during August 2017;
- Having had various members receiving the Arthur Troop Scholarship;
- Members participating in the Young Police Officers’ Seminars;

- Having been involved with the establishment of IPA Sections Lesotho, Eswatini, Mozambique and Botswana, as well as being a member section of the African Chapter of the IPA;
- The privilege of having had representation on the International Executive Board and International Commissions.

We acknowledge the dedication, commitment and integrity of the past Presidents, the National Executive Committees, and Regional Committees over all these years. We also acknowledge the support of the International Executive Board and other IPA Sections over so many years.

During a National Executive Committee Meeting (NEC) held on 27 August 2022 at the Johann Rissik Guest House, we were able to honour Pilot Loots, who could not be in Cape Town on 16 June 2022, with the Founder's Certificate.

IPA Kenya make Donation to Girls' Rescue Centre

It was a joyous moment on Friday 15th July 2022, when the International Police Association's Section Kenya donated textbooks worth 150,000 Shillings, five cartons of sanitary towels, five bales of maize flour, fifty kilograms of beans, cooking oil, soft drinks and assorted stationery to Kajiado Adventist Girls' School and Rescue Centre.

The institution, situated about 110 km from the capital city Nairobi offers shelter, quality education and protection to over 300 girls rescued from the harmful cultural practice of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) and early marriages.

The team, led by the IPA Kenya Secretary General, Mr. Jared Ojuok, and the 3rd Vice President and Chairperson of the Socio-Cultural Commission, Ms. Poline Munyi, arrived at the school at midday, and was warmly received by the school community and the local police commander.

In attendance were Mr. Lawrence Some, Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) from DCI Headquarters, and Mr. Daudi Oloronyokie, SSP, the Sub-County Commander, Kajiado, among other IPA members.

The Rescue Centre management congratulated the International Police Association's Section Kenya for the special gesture and initiative that they said would inspire hope among the young girls, and also strengthen the police-public relationship among the local community.

The Secretary General explained to the audience that the International Police Association was founded on one of the most fundamental elements of any given society: Friendship.

'Indeed, the Association's Motto, 'Servo Per Amikeco', which is Esperanto for 'Service Through Friendship' is a running call that reminds each one of us of humans' most basic instinct; the need to offer help to those in need.'

The Inspector General of the National Police Service, Mr. Hilary Mutyambai noted in his written speech that, 'Over the years, IPA Kenya Section has proved itself to be a real ambassador of friendship through activities such as these, and many more.

Today, we bring you good tidings of friendship, that your skies may shine brighter, and that this day may be memorable. May our coming here redouble your joy, and cut your grief, if at all, in half.'

The Inspector General stated that the National Police Service acknowledged the difficult past that most of the girls had been through, and assured them that the future is brighter for those who choose to take full advantage of the opportunity that the Rescue Centre has offered them to get quality education in a safe and secure environment.

IPA Poland's 10th Interregional #MeetingAtTheSummit

On July 19, at dawn, when there was a battle in the sky above the peaks of the Tatra Mountains between the darkness of the receding night and the first rays of the rising sun, the 10th Interregional expedition within the framework of IPA #MeetingAtTheSummit set off from the PTTK Morskie Oko Mountain Shelter to the highest peak of the Polish Tatra Mountains and the highest peak of the Crown of the Polish Mountains - Rysy (2499 m).



The group of 19 people, consisting of IPA members from the regions of Nowy Sącz, Nowy Targ, Karpacki, Jelenia Góra, Wrocław, as well as the Uroczysko-Piechowice Region and Podhale, set off along the red trail leading through Czarny Staw below Rysy to the highest peak in Poland in the pale light of the moon, which wandered in the brightening morning sky over the heads of the hikers, as if showing them the way.

Reaching Czarny Staw below Rysy was only a foretaste of the struggles that the participants of the expedition had to face along the way. The difficulties did not only concern the trail, which from Czarny Staw up to the summit meant gaining more meters of elevation with every step, but, also the personal, internal battle of each hiker with fatigue and fear of heights. In such circumstances, it is the support of the group that counts, which was especially true on the section of the trail where chains appeared.

Despite the uncertainty that arose at the sight of the chains and the demands that accompanied this section of the path, each participant knew that the goal of the expedition was really close (just 360 meters from the summit). Guided upwards by connected metal links, the expedition reached the Polish summit of Rysy (2499 m)

before 8:30 am, and the IPA members took up all the space available there and joyfully celebrated success.

To the joy of the hikers, it turned out that colleague Sławek had his birthday on that day, so a loud "Happy Birthday" was sung, and heartfelt wishes were showered on the birthday boy. The expedition then moved to the Slovak peak of Rysy (2503 m), where commemorative badges for reaching the summit were handed out. An unexpected summit meeting also took place here with a police officer from KWP Olsztyn working in Szczytno. After resting and saturating the eyes with the beautiful panorama of the Tatra Mountains on both sides of the border, the expedition started their way down to the Slovak side.



The way down led along the red trail via the Waga Pass to the Chata pod Rysami mountain hut, where the group arranged a stop to recuperate. Then, along the picturesque Mengusovska Valley with the Frog's Ponds, the participants continued on their way to the crossroads over the Frog's Brook. From there, along the blue trail, they continued on to Poprad Pond and then along an asphalt road to the Poprad Pond railroad station, where transport was waiting.

The **IPA #MeetingAtTheSummit** is an initiative aimed at popularising mountain tourism among members of the International Police Association, as well as promoting the Crown of Polish Peaks IPA project, which aims to climb the 28 highest peaks of 28 mountain ranges in Poland.

The climb to Rysy is the 10th mountain hike organised as part of the IPA **#MeetingsAtTheSummit** for Association members, their families and friends. Each subsequent expedition is met with greater interest and response from IPA members from different regions. We look forward to more equally successful events that integrate Association members and highlight the spirit of "Servo per Amikeco."
