Feeling welcome to Spain

Dear Friends,

A few words about the work of the last World Congress, which was masterfully organised by our Spanish friends, whom I would like to thank once again.

Almost all the sections were present for this reunion, after two years without this key event in our association's life. At least in person, since we had nevertheless organised two congresses by videoconference in 2020 and 2021.

The agenda of this 65th Congress was copious, and at least thirty decisions were taken by the IEC in its capacity as supreme body. They mainly concerned some fifteen motions, the validation of the annual reports, accounts and budgets of the IEB as well as the attribution of several international events. Without going into detail on each one, I will mention the main ones.

First of all, let us mention the definitive affiliation of Albania. Congratulations to our friends who have done a remarkable job in establishing a section in their country, with the notable support of the authorities and several sections, including Serbia as a sponsoring section. Expanding the IPA family is always an event. Welcome to Albania, who have been looking forward to this final validation, and congratulations to the main actors, including President Skender and his infectious enthusiasm. No doubt IPA Albania will grow rapidly and make a valuable and appreciated contribution to IPA.

Among the motions I am pleased to note, the thorny question of whether or not Russia should remain in our association was one of them. The debate was lively, open and frank, and many sections expressed their views on the subject, starting with our Ukrainian friends, to whom I reiterate our message of sympathy for the suffering they have endured. In the end, the assembly decided in favour of extending the suspension of Russia, without expulsion. It was recognised that our Russian colleagues have no control over the decisions of their government and that such a measure would allow us to follow the evolution of the situation without condemning our members by an exclusion measure. Let us hope that the situation will evolve quickly and that a peaceful solution will be found. The IPA stands for peace and friendship and wishes to express its sympathy to all its members who are suffering directly from this absurd conflict.

Also noteworthy, was the adoption by the assembly of a new logo proposed by the German section, which will be officially circulated to the sections once the ownership procedures have been settled between the different parties involved. This logo is not a drastic change, but an approach with a more modern design and including some territories that until now did not appear on the official logo, including Australia, New Zealand and Japan.

Finally, the delegates awarded the organisation of the 2025 World Congress to Poland (2023 and 2024 were already awarded to Greece and Northern Macedonia respectively), The 2026 YPOS to Germany (2023: New Zealand; 2024: Austria; 2025: Belgium), and the next IPA Games to Romania in 2024 and Poland in 2026.

There is much more to say, but I will leave this summary of the main points to the reports that the different sections will surely publish on this Congress. Finally, I would like to reiterate my thanks to the Spanish section for the organisation, to my IEB colleagues and the IAC staff for their extraordinary contribution throughout the year, and to all the sections,

65TH WORLD CONGRESS - THANK YOU IPA SPAIN

The 65th IPA World Congress took place between the 4th and 9th October 2022 in Lloret de Mar, Catalonia, Spain. Some 300 people gathered in person for the first time since 2019. It was clear that we all had missed the intimacy lacking in recent online meetings.

The organising committee managed a change of venue from Barcelona to Lloret de Mar and two years of postponement due to the Covid pandemic, with good humour and professionalism. They ensured that everyone was transported from the airport to the hotel, had a room, a badge and all information needed on the programme. Our thanks go to both the current and past Presidents of IPA Spain, Antonio Gomez Montejano and Arturo Salinas Marin and to all the members of the organising committee and the volunteers who helped before and during the congress week, answering the same questions over and over again with care and attention for everyone.



The Opening Ceremony took place in the Evenia Olympic Palace, Imperial Park Lounge. Following the IPA hymn by a musical trio, we respected a minutes silence, in the presence of honoured guests from the Police Prefecture Commission. Director General of the Police, the Cos Mossos d'Esquadra, Cos Nacional de Policia ,the Guardia Civil and Urban Police.

Welcome speeches were made by or on behalf of the Vice President of Catalonia and the Councillor for Citizen Security and by Antonio Jesús Gómez Montejano, President of IPA Spain.

Pierre-Martin Moulin, IEB President gave a speech in return and declared the World Congress open. Gifts were exchanged and further musical items were performed by the trio.

All agreed that the ceremony achieved the correct balance of gravity and friendship and was neither too brief nor too extended. As is customary, we then moved outside for a group photograph.

After lunch there was an IPA Gathering, where a number of informative films and presentations were made to the delegates and guests. The sections then had the opportunity to offer food and drink and display items, representing their national culture at individual tables to delegates, and guests enjoyed mingling and interacting with each other.

On the Friday evening, we all travelled to dinner in a



local themed restaurant. We were treated to superb flamenco dancing and music and many took to the stage to display their own dancing skills. The next day we were in Barcelona to tour the sights, visit a magnificent seafood restaurant and head out on a boat trip along the coast from the city marina. A mild swell caused merriment as some discovered their sea legs needed practice. The grand finale was the Gala dinner, where we were in a position to thank our hosts, IPA Spain and especially the organising committee led by Manel Castellví del Peral for their outstanding professionalism and friendship. A lovely dinner was followed by dancing and much fun. Early on the Sunday morning the organisers swung into action again to make sure we all got on the correct buses to get to the airport.

Wednesday, October 5th

In the morning, the WC opening ceremony was held. Attendees, who were noticeably in uniform, were seated in an orderly fashion, the IPA hymn was played, and a moment of silence was observed for those who had passed away. This was followed by the welcome speech by IPA Spain President and the opening address by IPA President. The opening ceremony was a friendly and enjoyable one, which also included instrumental music and singing. Following the opening ceremony, participants went out to the courtyard for the group photo session.

In the afternoon, the "International Gathering" took place, with presentations of ongoing initiatives and event plans in each section, and messages from the IEB members. Several sections also set up booths in the venue, offering food and drinks of their own specialties, and I enjoyed visiting them.

While I was relaxing in the courtyard, a man approached me. He asked, "Are you a wrestler?" and continued "Your ears are wrestler's ones". Thursday, October 6th and Friday, October 7th

On both days, the motions were discussed. There were 19 motions on the agenda, which were submitted in advance by the IEB and other sections. It was a constructive and positive congress.

At Lunch with IBZ Staff

Two representatives from IBZ, the IPA's information and education organisation, were also present at the WC. Over lunch with them, I had a chance to talk about IBZ's training programs. IBZ conducts many seminars every year, and in 2021, two people from Japan participated in the 'Cybercrime and Digital Investigation Training.' They said that IBZ would welcome further participants from Japan.

First Meeting with Former IAC Office Manager Elke

The IAC is the secretariat of the IPA headquarters and serves as a link between the IEB and each section. Elke, as the office manager, has taken care of all of us kindly, and thoughtfully until September of this year. Although she left shortly before the WC, I had the good fortune to meet her at the venue. She had started a new career and her successor is Hana. We would like to send our thanks to Elke and our encouragement to Hana.



Saturday, October 8th

We toured around Barcelona. The first stop was the Sagrada Familia Cathedral. The cathedral is a famous Gaudi's architecture, registered as a World Heritage site, and has not been completed yet, although the construction started in 1882. The sheer size of the cathedral was overwhelming and truly "worth seeing". Afterwards, we enjoyed the view of the city of Barcelona from a cruise ship.



Gala Dinner and Ceremonies

In the evening, the gala dinner was held, followed by ceremonies such as the awarding of IPA meritorious service award, the handing over of the IPA flag to Greece, the next WC host section, and the celebration of IPA Albania's full affiliation, as well as a speech from the Ukrainian delegate. I was impressed by the way he suppressed his emotions and expressed his gratitude. I had a chance to talk to him directly, and it was an unforgettable memory.

I envied the European dance culture. As the music started playing, a man and a woman stepped forward and began to dance. They were not a young couple, but a similar age to myself. They seemed to be having a lot of fun, moving smoothly and in sync with each other. I thought again, "Dancing is a good thing." We said goodbye to the WC crew members and boarded the bus for the airport. It was nice to be able to thank Agustin, the leader of the crew.

The scenery from the window of the bus on the way to the airport was just as beautiful as when we arrived. We boarded the plane to Frankfurt, hoping to visit Spain again.

IAN GLENDINNING – OVERALL WINNER OF THE PHOTO COMPETITION

I'm 64 years old and I retired from Northumbria Police after 32 years' service in 2006, serving mostly in the Firearms Training Department.

Since retiring, I embarked on a degree course with the Open University and was awarded a BSc (hons) degree in Combined STEM 2 years ago. I was also elected as a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society. I'm currently studying Environmental Management and Sustainability on an MSc course with Derby University, part of which includes a research project on red squirrels. I'm the chair of the Coquetdale Squirrel Group, working to conserve red squirrels in one of the last areas in England where they can be found.

I've had an interest in photography since my school days and once I retired, found the time to take it more seriously. I managed to combine my love and studies of science, astronomy and nature with taking photographs, and last year began studying a small colony of the endangered red squirrel on the farm where I live in Northumberland. This provided numerous photo opportunities.

The winning photograph was a fortunate by product of those studies. I wanted to get really close up photos of the faces of the squirrels in an attempt to identify features peculiar to individuals, in order to keep track of them. I placed an old camera on the lawn to get them used to a strange object, intending to replace it with a remotely operated modern digital camera once they were comfortable with it. I needn't have worried – no sooner had I placed the camera on the lawn they were investigating it out of sheer curiosity. I extended the experiment to other objects, all of which were treated in the same manner. I found that they also appeared to use these objects as reference points when burying hazelnuts – one squirrel can bury 50 plus hazelnuts in an hour!

IPA GERMANY—MUNSTER ON PATROL



I had the opportunity to attend Münster in Germany with the IPA along with 9 other Police Officers from different countries. My journey began at London Heathrow where I flew to Düsseldorf and then took a train to Münster. I was met by Elli, a Police Officer from the local area who picked me up and took me to the accommodation at the Police Training center where we would be staying for the trip. Callum, a Police Officer from the Netherlands was already there. By nature, he asked at reception if they had pushbikes, which they did and we cycled into the City to explore and got to know each other. It was

strange, although we had just met, we already had a bond and we exchanged experiences and stories and ate some local food. We were then joined by Emil from Denmark who also braved the cycle. When the other countries started arriving, we cycled back to the training center where I met the others from Austria, Germany, Estonia, Ireland, Luxembourg, France, and Finland. The facilities at our accommodation were immense. A canteen, running track, football pitch and other amenities, including Kegal (skittles) which we played in the evening to get to know each other and sample some of their beer, which was only fair. That night we attended the bar which was located in the training center where Fabian and Lisa, two Austrian Police Officers showed us some Schnapps that they brought from their country. It was great getting to know each other in this setting, we spoke and laughed for hours.



The next day we were up early and in uniform to attend the local police university to welcome their new class of

2022, who are beginning their 3 years training. It was nice to see the other countries in their uniform, the detail and quality was stunning. The entire group were disappointed that I didn't wear my Custodian and were confused with why I had a white cap. We had breakfast at the university and we met Adi who was the host of the event and had arranged our events. He was incredibly passionate about Policing and the IPA and was so excited we were there. We met a lot of the classes and spoke to them about our experiences with the IPA and what it had to offer. It was nice to be able to tell them about the opportunities such as this event and travelling the world.



We then attended their Police Headquarters where Philip, a German Police Officer, showed us around the Headquarters and we spent some time in the control room and major incident room. The functions and processes were similar, and it was surreal being in this familiar environment. We went outside and we were shown around some of their fleet and had a demo of some of the equipment. They had everything needed for every eventuality, and it was a shock as I was used to the kit that was kept in the back of a British response car. We had lunch at Subway, confusing the local community with a group of Police Officers all in different uniforms waiting to eat.





Next was a museum in the city, the Hall of Peace. It originally served as a council chamber and the fine detail renaissance wood panelling dated from around 1577 was striking. The chambers negotiated and concluded the Thirty Years' War in Western Europe and the Eighty Years' War between Spain and the Republic of the Seven United Netherlands. The mayor even set aside some time to speak to us and welcome us to the beautiful city, and provide us with a glass of wine as we had a look around and signed the guestbook on behalf of the IPA.

We had a lot of plans for this evening, and on the way to eat we stopped by the Münster Cathedral from the 12th century which is dedicated to St Paul and then headed to the restaurant which was lovely. We then had a guided tour from a Night Watchman. His character was so interesting and he made it very entertaining. The tour was in German, however luckily I followed Gilles from Luxembourg around and he had the pleasure to translate for me. I was told the Watchman was speaking in 'Shakespearean' styled language and he was telling everyone what the City was like in the past. The Watchman carried with him, a rather interesting offensive weapon that would get pointed at us throughout the tour, quite unsettling when you couldn't understand what he was asking! The sky then opened and it poured it down. Some of the other officers were well equipped with umbrellas, however I put on a brave British face and got soaked wet through!

The next day we attended Villa ten Hompel. A historical site which was the headquarters of the National Socialist police force and a place of denazification and the department for reparations in post-war Germany. It was a sombre visit, however an incredibly informative and interesting World War II museum. We were educated about the role the Police played during the war. The two historians who were there were incredibly enthusiastic and amazed about the IPA, and how we were all from different countries.



This was our last night, and we were invited to Peter's house, a Police Officer and president of IPA Münster. He was so generous, and his hospitality was well received. We had a BBQ in the garden with some of his favourite Gin, and surrounded the bonfire and the Beer Pong table which was such a laugh. We had friendly competition between the countries: Ireland vs England, Netherlands vs Finland, and Luxembourg vs Germany. The winning team is still in dispute...

The next day was our last day, although I was exhausted from such a well packed week it was such a shame to be going. We all exchanged gifts and patches, and IPA Münster supplied us with a nice goody bag which was such a nice thought. We all bonded so well as a group, and it was sad we were all having to go our separate ways. I've now got friends in each of these countries who have welcomed me to visit whenever. I'm sure we will be staying in contact, and I've got to thank the International Police Association for this unique opportunity to be part of something like this.

OBITUARY—BILL PETHERICK IPA UK

Bill was secretary of IPA 1 Region, Scotland, chair of Ayrshire branch and of course a much loved and respected past president of Section UK. He was an evergreen member of many IPA groups. The life and soul of the IPA coffee mornings, the glue that inspired and welded the writers' group together, a member of the painting group and a mainstay of Scottish membership. Amongst many other contributions by pen, by brush and by song.

But most of all in his lifetime Bill was a husband to his beloved wife Freda, a father to Little Bill, and a firm, but fair and compassionate police officer who was awarded with three commendations for bravery.

In the last months of his life Bill took on his first and last road trip since the death of his beloved wife Freda in 2015. He met up with IPA friends in Wales and within Devon and Cornwall, but most of all he met up with family he hadn't see for over 20 years. He even visited the village of Little Petherick in Cornwall, his ancestral seat.

Bill was a giant of a man, literally and in personality. He will be remembered mostly not for the roles he undertook within the IPA, but for his compassion, his contagious enthusiasm and thirst to learn new skills, his humour which he portrayed in his art and his writing, and for his friendship toward all he met. He touched so many lives and left those of us privileged enough to have met him in person or more recently, through the medium of the internet, the better for that meeting. His passing will leave a hole in a lot of lives.

Bill once said to my wife and I when talking about Freda. "I truly believe that I will be with her again". You are now with your beloved wife Bill.
